Select Accomplishments as Dean:

Administrative:

- Successfully managed \$20 Million budget for College of Law;
- Separated admissions from career services within the College of Law, appointed a new director of each unit, and improved outcomes in both;
- Began the college's first formal academic success program and hired the college's first director of academic success;
- Began the college's first pre-orientation program to ensure opportunities for non-traditional law students to thrive from day one;
- Created the college's first comprehensive emergency preparedness plan, including installing panic buttons for the legal clinic and in other key areas of the law school;
- Renovated portions of the college's physical space to add a new seminar classroom for active learning, and new, dedicated office space for the Professional Leadership Institute, emeriti faculty, and director of admissions; also renovated and updated the staff lounge and faculty services suite;
- Expanded the communications team and facilitated modernization of communication outreach, including launching a new web site, new tagline for college, and increased video presence and outreach;
- Sought and obtained job upgrades from the University for multiple staff positions, resulting in salary increases for many deserving college employees;
- Created a committee for innovation and ideas comprised of faculty and administrative staff to explore innovative and entrepreneurial ideas for the college.

Admissions:

- Increased first-year enrollment by 33%, while maintaining median LSAT/UGPA of smaller entering class and facilitated managed growth thereafter, while maintaining quality;
- Increased the percentage of out-of-state students from 19 to 37%;
- Kept tuition flat for three of four years, helping college to receive rank of 7th (in 2015) and 8th (in 2016) for law schools that graduate students with the least debt, and resulting in top 20 "best value" ranking from National Jurist Magazine in 2018 and 2016;
- Adopted an early admissions policy for military personnel;
- Increased the diversity of students in entering classes.

Career Services:

- Selected new director for career services and adopted more proactive approach to student and employer outreach;
- Increased percentage of graduates employed at graduation by 31% in four years and increased percentage of graduates employed within 10 months after graduation from 83% to 94% in three years, exceeding the national average by 15%.

- Increased number of career services personnel and implemented an innovative regional approach to employer outreach in Middle Tennessee, including hiring a career services professional who lives and works in Nashville and on-location, traveling interviews.

Diversity:

- Diversified the college's leadership team in terms of age, gender, and ethnicity;
- Appointed college's first director of diversity and inclusion;
- Increased diversity of Alumni Council and Dean's Circle advisory groups;
- Held SAFEZONE and other diversity training for faculty, staff, and students;
- Hosted and supported numerous diversity events within the college, across the University, and in the community;
- Began the college's first diversity pipeline program for high school students, urging them to pursue college as well as graduate and professional school after graduation.

Faculty:

- Increased entry-level faculty salaries by 10%;
- Increased faculty summer research stipends by 18%;
- Increased yearly faculty achievement awards by 50 to 100%;
- Created a new junior faculty award for excellence in scholarship;
- Started a distinguished speakers series to attract accomplished scholars to the college.

Fundraising:

- Launched public phase of \$45 Million capital campaign in the first six months as dean and led the development team to close \$22 Million in pledges and receipts in first fifteen months;
- By year three, exceeded \$45 Million campaign goal, more than two years before the campaign end;
- In first year, added a second development officer to grow the team and increase fundraising, resulting in sustained increase of yearly fundraising by over 50%;
- Created a new giving society—the Hughett-Campbelle Society, recognizing annual donors of \$1,000 or more;
- Doubled yearly gifts of \$100,000 or more;
- Instituted yearly donor appreciation event to thank major donors;
- Reinstated reunion and homecoming events to increase engagement with alumni.

Students:

- Finalized and implemented a new program in which students can earn both an undergraduate and law degree in six years, rather than seven, and extended that program to UT Martin, as well as UT Knoxville;

- Established a new, semester-in-residence program in Nashville, Tennessee, to facilitate additional, practical legal preparation for students in their third year in a city of choice for permanent employment;
- Facilitated the adoption of the college's first mandatory mean for first-year and required courses to ensure equity among students' grades;
- Formed a dean's student advisory group of diverse students to ensure regular communication between dean and law students;
- Began the college's first service project as part of orientation to build community from day one of law school.
- Instituted a new flex-schedule, part-time option for students;
- Proposed a Masters in Legal Studies to attract and educate students who desire legal education but not a Juris Doctor degree;
- Launched a wellness initiative to ensure students and faculty are supported beyond their academic needs.
